wide. Founded in 2006, Building Homes for Heroes has set the pace for providing both builtfrom-scratch homes, as well as custom modified existing homes to wounded veterans across the nation, at no charge to the recipient. Capt Nathan Nelson, one of the most recent

Mr. Pearson, a 1997 graduate of Embry Riddle Aeronautical University with a

> **B.S.** in Professional Aeronautics, retired from the Air Force after 24 years combined service as an Aircraft Maintenance Specialist, and AC-130 Loadmaster Instructor Evaluator with over 5,000 flight hours. He currently serves as Associate Manager

and Field Engineer with Lockheed Martin Mission Systems and Training at Hurlburt Field, FL. He and his team are responsible for training our future warfighters by providing realistic training unavailable except in combat through a concept known as Distributed Mission Training (DMT). By linking high fidelity simulators located at Hurlburt with other simulators around the world, DMT provides the capability to fly and train realistically within a virtual battlespace.

Military Birthdays

According to the Department of Defense Directive 1005.8, the prescribed precedence of military flags is determined by service birthdays. The appropriate order is given below:

Army Birthday – 14 June 1775 Marine Corps Birthday – 10 November 1775 Navy Birthday – 13 Oct 1775 (Abolished Feb 1781 -Reinstated 7 Sep 1781) Air Force Birthday – 18 September 1947 *Coast Guard Birthday – 4 August 1790

*If, during wartime, the Coast Guard is called into service under the control of the Department of Defense, then the Coast Guard flag would come before the Air Force flag in order of precedence.


You also may want to check out the professional reading lists compiled by National Defense University (NDU). There you'll find recommendations from each military service and other prominent sources.

Classical military historian Victor Davis Hanson explores why Western values and armies have triumphed over non-Western values and armies for centuries, using nine battles to illustrate the martial superiority of Western cultural dynamism. With gritty battlefield descriptions and astute intellectual analyses, Hanson tells of the battles of Salamis, Gaugamela, Cannae,



Poitiers, Tenochtitlan, Lepanto, Rorke's Drift, Midway, and Tet (Vietnam). This is outstanding military history that concludes: "It all comes down to the Western knack of killing."



Professor of National Security Affairs at the Naval War College in Newport, R.I., Derek S. Reveron discusses the roles and missions of the U.S. and its military forces in the 21st century, an era of changing security needs and opportunities, with greater reliance of technology, the fluid reliability of allies and security partners, and politicians' increased use of the U.S. military



as a foreign policy tool (a blunt instrument, to some). Reveron argues security assistance to other countries means military personnel must be soldiers, builders, diplomats, and guardians — a delicate balance indeed.

Auxiliary Liaison Excellence Award

In April, members of the Auxiliary Member Advisory Committee voted to become the Surviving Spouse Advisory Committee (SSAC). This column was renamed to reflect that change. The Auxiliary Liaison Excellence Award also will be renamed following MOAA's annual meeting in October.

The Auxiliary Liaison Excellence Award is presented each year to a surviving spouse (formerly auxiliary) liaison who has demonstrated superior performance in recruitment and retention, representation, and leadership. Eleanor Layman, the 2014 recipient, represented both the Maryland Council of Chapters and the Fort George G. Meade (Md.) Chapter.

Last year, the SSAC received seven nominations for this award for outstanding service to a local chapter or council or both. Each nomination packet was excellent, making the final choice difficult.

Some liaisons spearheaded letter-writing campaigns about survivor legislative issues and served on the board of directors for their chapter or council. Other liaisons organized Veterans Day events and special

> recognition dinners for surviving spouses, communicated by phone or email with chapter members and the committee, wrote articles for chapter and council newsletters, and recruited new members from other community organizations.

Members of the SSAC will review all of the packages and select the winner. MOAA will provide transportation, food, and lodging for the honoree to attend the 2015 MOAA annual meeting in Orlando, Fla., Oct. 30-31, where the winner will receive this special award. I can't think of a better way to say thank you to a valued member of your team!

No one knows the talents and leadership of our surviving spouse liaisons better than MOAA's council and chapter presidents. Members of the national board of directors and SSAC members also may nominate a surviving spouse liaison. (Please note a former SSAC member must wait three years after leaving the committee before he or she can be nominated for the Auxiliary Liaison Excellence Award.)



The New Legions: American Strategy and the <u>Responsibility of Power</u>

By Maj. Gen. Edward B. Atkeson. Rowman & Littlefield Publishers, 2012. ISBN 978-1-4422-1377-7.

Facing the reality of depleted defense budgets, exhausted forces, and stalemate wars, Maj. Gen. Edward B. Atkeson presents a cogent and convincing argument that the U.S. needs to shift military missions to allies, other security partners, and a new legion of fighters. An attitude of "more of the same" is neither sustainable nor desired, he says; instead, the U.S. should invest in




legions of indigenous fighters for mutual security. With the French Foreign Legion as an example, Atkeson discusses how such forces could be raised and employed in Latin America, Africa, the Balkans, and even the Middle East and Southeast Asia. This is an innovative and provocative approach to national and global security.

<u>The Twilight War: The Secret History of America's</u> <u>Thirty-Year Conflict With Iran</u>

By David Crist. Penguin Press, 2012. ISBN 978-1-59420-341-1.

With timely analysis and vivid explanation, federal government historian David Crist offers a comprehensive and meticulously researched history of the U.S.-Iran conflict from the fall of the shah in 1979 to today. This is the most revealing book yet on U.S.-Iran relations, exposing just how close the two nations came to war on numerous occasions. Crist tells of the Iranian



Revolution, the shadow battles of spies, terrorists, covert operations, intelligence failures, miscalculations by both sides, and Iran's determined quest to obtain nuclear weapons. Crist also carefully and convincingly explains why "the Iran problem" cannot be ignored or marginalized. This is a very serious and well-written military-political-geostrategic history of a simmering conflict.

Scholarship Program

Although our scholarships for 2015 have been awarded to five graduating JROTC students of local high schools, our fund-raising is a continuous effort to be able to sustain this worthy program.

One way to financially support our Scholarship Fund which provides scholarships to promising JROTC students of our County high schools is by making a **bequest** – a gift made through your will or trust fund. Donations of this type allow you to retain control of your assets during your lifetime and distribute them as you wish upon your death. After providing for loved ones, many people choose to include a gift to nonprofit charitable organizations in their wills. The NWFMOA Scholarship Fund fits this category. Some of the most common types of bequests include a fixed dollar amount, a specific property, a percentage of the estate, or the residual portion of the estate. A charitable bequest may reduce the estate tax. Consult an attorney when making or revising a will or trust plan to ensure compliance with state law and to minimize any applicable taxes.

For bequests to the NWFMOA Scholarship Fund, your attorney may find the following wording useful: "I give and bequeath ______(description of property) and/or the sum of \$______ to NWFMOA Scholarship Fund, a Florida non-profit charitable organization (EIN: 59-3434498) that is tax-exempt under section 501(c)3 of the Internal Revenue Code. These funds are to be used for the college education of JROTC graduates under the guidelines of the NWFMOA Scholarship Fund, Inc."

Another way to assist raising funds for our scholarships upon your death or the death of a loved one is to request that anyone who desires to contribute to a memorial do so to the **NWFMOA Scholarship Fund**. NWFMOA members who have used this method in the past few years have raised over \$5,000 for our scholarship program.

A third method to help fund our scholarships is to become a member of the B/Gen Frank Glunn Century Club with a donation of \$100 or more. These donations may be made by sending a check with the "Scholarship Donation Form" or at our www.NWFMOA.org website using your credit card or PayPal on the Scholarship Fund page by clicking the "Pay Now" button. Agent Orange Compensation Extended to C-123 Crews

The Department of Veterans Affairs extended coverage to airmen suffering certain conditions linked to repeated contact with contaminated C-123 Provider aircraft used to spray Agent Orange chemicals during Operation Ranch Hand in Vietnam, officials announced. "Opening up eligibility for this deserving group of Air Force veterans and reservists is the right thing to do," VA Secretary Robert McDonald said in a June 18 release. The decision follows a 2015 report by the Institute of Medicine detailing the health consequences of exposure to dioxin-tainted aircraft, even years after their use in Vietnam, according to the release. "We thank the IOM for its thorough review that provided the supporting evidence needed to ensure we can now fully compensate any former crew member who develops an Agent Orange-related disability," added McDonald. The inquest found that as many as 2,100 Active Duty and Air Force Reserve Command aircrew, maintainers, and aeromedical personnel could have been exposed to harmful chemicals. AFRES personnel who served on the aircraft at Lockbourne/Rickenbacker ANGB, Ohio, Westover AFB, Mass., Pittsburg IAP, Pa., or Active Duty airmen that served on C-123s at several bases between 1969 and 1986 are encouraged to submit compensation claims, according to the VA.
