Now please clearly understand that I am in NO way taking personal credit for all of this. No person in a leadership position ever accomplished the mission by themselves. It's the product of many people working together and bringing to bear their own talents, time, and devotion. And there are many of you out there which I thanked in last month's column and do again here.

On a final note, the opening line in my continuity file (remember those?) to my successor was "The most important responsibilities of the president are leadership and providing a positive momentum to the chapter. All else below supports that in various ways." I'm confident that will happen.

Two Chapter Members Inducted into Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame

On Tuesday, December 4, 2018, two of our NWFMOA Chapter members were honored in Tallahassee when they were inducted into the Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame. The Hall of Fame honors veterans who 'through their work and lives during or after military service, have made a significant contribution to the State of Florida'.

Among the 2018 inductees were **Brig Gen Patt Maney**, USAR, Ret., and **Major Charles** (**Chuck**) **Merkel, Jr.**, USA, Ret., PHd. (in History).

Brig. Gen. Patt Maney is a veteran of 37 years in the Army Reserves and is a recently retired Okaloosa County Judge who is credited with founding the Veterans' Court program for the State of Florida, as well as a pioneer in Mental Health Court. Severely wounded in Afghanistan by an IED, Brig Gen/Judge Maney applied his own experiences as a recovering wounded warrior to establish more fair treatment of physically and mentally wounded veterans in the courts system. He also established the Okaloosa County Homeless Veterans' Stand Down program, and was instrumental in establishing the VA's Vet Center in Okaloosa County. Brig Gen Maney was recently sworn in as northern Florida's new civilian aide to the Secretary of the Army in a Pentagon ceremony.

Dr. Charles Merkel, Jr. was recognized for his humanitarian work during his military service, both while active duty with the U.S. Army and as a DoD civilian at Eglin AFB, FL. Major Merkel was a UH-1N pilot while serving with the U.S Army for 20 years. As a DoD civilian, Merkel served as the historian for the 53d Wing at Eglin AFB. Much of his humanitarian endeavors involved working with programs involving children's education and orphanages in Vietnam, the Republic of Korea and Afghanistan. Some of his humanitarian awards include being honored by People to People International for his work with orphanages, Sunday Schools and the Korean people while assigned to Korea on active duty. As a civilian deployed to Afghanistan as part of the 451st Air Expeditionary Wing and the 386th Air Expeditionary Wing, Merkel was awarded the Exemplary Civilian Service Medal (twice); the Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal (twice); and a special award from the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) for his with school districts, church groups, and individuals.

Also inducted into the 2018 Hall of Fame class from our region was Lt. Gen. Gordon "Gordie" Fornell of Niceville, FL.

Medicare/TRICARE Costs Increase for 2019

Medicare recently released its new rates for 2019. After staying the same last year, Medicare and TRICARE for Life beneficiaries will see their Part B premium increase slightly this year. The Part B standard premium is set to increase \$1.50 per month, from \$134 to \$135.50.

The new premiums for 2019:

Part B premium: \$135.50 (was \$134) Part B deductible: \$185 (was \$183) Part A deductible (inpatient) \$1,364 (was \$1,340)

Premiums for higher-income beneficiaries (\$85,000 and above) can be found on the TRICARE webpage.


